



## Sylvester's Dance Hall

The building, which had been erected in 1917, was one of the largest pavilions of its kind in the state. In 1944 Sylvester's Dance hall collapsed due to the weight of snow from a storm. It was located on Route 136 near the power lines, where the foundation remains today.







## The Eureka Grange Hall


The Eureka Grange #7

Durham Fire Department
















Nathan Douglas, born in 1812, began preaching at the age of 22, and was the principal minister for half a century






Seated left to right, Lucy Lunt, Emaline Newell, Amos Franklin Lunt, Albert Minot, Standing is Mary Goddard age 98
















